What qualities are fundamental to becoming a successful IP attorney?

Curiosity and a genuine interest in the technologies and innovations. I do not have a scientific background, as I'm fairly certain that political science does not qualify, and have had to work a little harder during my career to understand the scientific and technical aspects of my clients' technology. Understanding and appreciating the problems that your client is trying to solve helps build your client's trust and respect.

Practicality and commercial-mindedness. A successful IP attorney should understand IP's role in the transaction, whether it is material, and the practical realities and consequences of any related risks within the context of the client's commercial goals.

Clear communication. IP concepts and the legal issues associated with their development and commercialization can be complex. Clients value clear and coherent communication about risks and rewards, as it allows them to make informed business decisions.

What accomplishments are you most proud of from the past year?

Professionally, I am most proud of the innovative artificial intelligence projects and matters that I have worked on in the last year, helping our clients address the incredible challenges and opportunities that AI brings to their businesses. As a member of Latham & Watkins' AI task

force over the past year, I have advised emerging and established AI pioneers, creators of foundational technology, companies in industries that are undergoing AI-powered transformations, and others using that technology to grow their businesses on IP matters as well as licensing, development, collaboration, and data-sharing agreements, strategic alliances,
